NEW BROCHURE TARGETS TROUBLESOME ISSUE

House-soiling is a big reason people relinquish their cats, but it can be corrected, says the American Association of Feline Practitioners.

To teach cat owners that they can resolve litterbox issues, the organization released a free fourpage brochure titled "Feline House-Soiling: Useful Information for Cat Owners."

The brochure explains the basic causes and ways to prevent or manage house-soiling behaviors, says Heather O'Steen, AAFP executive director.

"This brochure is a complete and comprehensive tool with the purpose to educate, thus decreasing the number of cats being abandoned or relinquished due to these behaviors, and allowing more cats to live long, happy lives in their current households," she says.

Some tips from the brochure:
The basic causes of house-soiling are environmental and

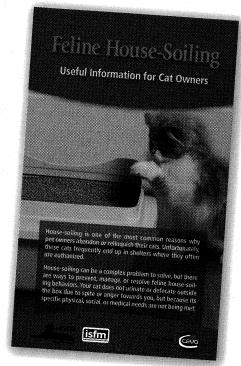
social factors, marking behavior and medical problems such as feline idiopathic cystitis, a lower urinary tract disease.

Manage the environmental and social causes by providing one litterbox per cat plus one extra; making sure the boxes are the right size (at least 1½ times the length of the cat from nose tip to the base of its tail); putting them in quiet places; filling them with a litter the cat prefers; and cleaning them at least once per day.

To handle the marking behavior, neuter or spay your cats, restrict access to other cats who are perceived as a threat and clean urine-marked areas frequently.

Visits to the veterinarian can identify and resolve medical causes of house-soiling behavior.
